In honor of Black History Month, a few of our writers submitted biographical snapshots of some prominent leaders in Black History.

Frederick Douglass was a former



slave who was brave enough to run away to the northern states and convince Abraham Lincoln to free slaves during the

Civil War. Lincoln was running out of people to fight in his army, and Fredrick Douglass explained to him that if you let the slaves free they can fight for him.

Harriet Tubman escaped from slavery in the South and became a leading abolitionist before the

American Civil
War. She was born
in Maryland in
1820, and successfully escaped in
1849, yet she re-



turned many times to rescue both family members and non-relatives from the plantation system. She led hundreds to freedom in the North as the most famous "conductor" on the Underground Railroad, an elaborate secret net-

work of safe houses organized for that purpose.

Born in Delaware in 1930,

Clifford
Brown began
exhibiting
extraordinary
expertise on
the trumpet in



his early teens. His rich tone, virtuoso technique and graceful style kept Brown continually working and growing in popularity. He was especially noted for his ability to improvise in long, melodic phrases. The jazz standard "Joy Spring" (1954) is one of his best-known songs. Tragically killed in a car accident in 1956, at age 25, Brown has been praised as the "greatest trumpeter that ever lived" by musicians such as Herb Alpert and Quincy Jones.

Claudette Colvin was born on September 5, 1939, in Montgomery, Alabama. On March 2, 1955, she refused to give up her bus seat to a white passenger. Some say that she was the first Rosa Parks. She was arrested and became one of four plaintiffs in *Browder v. Gayle*, which ruled that Montgomery's segregated bus system was unconstitutional. Colvin

moved to New York City and worked as a nurse's aide. She retired in 2004.

But a caged bird stands on the grave of dreams his shadow shouts on a nightmare scream his wings are clipped and his feet are tied so he opens his throat to sing



P.EL: The purpose was to get a message out to teachers and parents...that they are important and influential.


KM: When were you featured on C-SPAN, CNN, Oprah Radio, Dr. Oz, or NPR Radio?

MW: The hardest part about my job is meeting many deadlines.




RA: If you could do it all over again, would you have chosen the same career? If not, what would you have chosen?

What is the Zika Virus?

Zika virus is an emerging mosquito-borne virus that was first identified in Uganda in 1947 in rhesus monkeys through a monitoring network of sylvatic yellow fever. It was subsequently identified in humans in 1952 in Uganda and the United Republic of Tanzania. Outbreaks of Zika virus disease have been recorded in Africa, the Americas, Asia and the Pacific.

Key Facts

- Zika virus disease is caused by a virus transmitted by Aedes mosquitoes.
- People with Zika virus disease usually have symptoms that can include mild fever, skin rashes, conjunctivitis, muscle and joint pain, malaise or headache.
 These symptoms normally

last for 2-7 days.

- There is no specific treatment or vaccine currently available.
- The best form of prevention is protection against mosquito bites.

The virus is known to circulate in Africa, the Americas, Asia and the Pacific.

Signs and Symptoms

The incubation period (the time from exposure to symptoms) of Zika virus disease is not clear, but is likely to be a few days. The symptoms include fever, skin rashes, conjunctivitis, muscle and joint pain, illness, and headache. These symptoms are usually mild and last for 2-7 days.

Prevention

Mosquitoes and their breeding

sites pose a significant risk factor for Zika virus infection. Prevention and control relies on reducing mosquitoes through source reduction (removal and modification of breeding sites) and reducing contact between mosquitoes and people.

This can be done by using insect repellent regularly; wearing clothes (preferably lightcoloured) that cover as much of the body as possible; using physical barriers such as window screens, closed doors and windows; and if needed, additional personal protection, such as sleeping under mosquito nets during the day. It is extremely important to empty, clean or cover containers regularly that can store water, such as buckets, drums, pots etc. Other mosquito breeding sites should be cleaned or removed including flower pots, used tires and roof gutters. Communities must support the efforts of the local government to reduce the density of mosquitoes in their locality.
